President's Message

I am pleased to report another successful year for Rockville Cemetery Association in 2017. Our non-profit organization continues to be blessed with a group of devoted, hard-working board members and other volunteers. Our long-time partnerships with a cadre of outstanding contractors also continue to reap many benefits. These include our grave digger, Scotty Combs; Solar Gardens, which maintains the grounds; Pogo Tree Experts; Mosko Monument Services and Lough Memorials, two companies that perform gravestone conservation and repairs; Dick Stoner, our house manager; and Joe Deniker, who handles house repairs and many other jobs around the property.

The cemetery grounds are in fine shape. Our upgraded website and

Facebook page appear to be doing the job we anticipated, providing information to families, generating interest, and responding to many more inquiries. Sales of grave sites and columbarium niches in 2016 were higher than any previous year, and 2017 sales have substantially exceeded those levels. Burials and inurnments are steady, month after month.

Volunteer board members continue to give time and talent to serve the community in so many ways, handling grave site sales and supporting burials, enhancing the website and other key publicity pieces, working diligently on improving the landscape, and more. Have you noticed that many monuments in the Upper Cemetery have been lovingly cleaned? It's hard to miss them!

A major accomplishment completed this year was the hook-up of the Caretaker's Cottage to the Rockville public water system. The house had operated on a well since 1889. This \$15,000 project was completed with the assistance of the City of Rockville, as part of Rockville Cemetery's agreement related to public improvements to Baltimore Road. The Baltimore Road project should begin in earnest during 2018 and will generate some changes to the Lower Cemetery primarily. The west entrance will be relocated farther east on the other side of the creek, and the vehicle bridge over the creek will be removed. In the future, RCA plans to construct a pedestrian bridge to re-connect the Lower Cemetery road to the Upper Cemetery grounds.

In October this year, RCA staged a

"Ghost Tour," successfully partnering with Peerless Rockville for enthusiastic attendance and substantial fund-raising. Thanks to our newest board member Hanne Quigley, along with Eileen McGuckian and Mike Grant for their work on this event. Appreciation also goes to Tim Mertz, invaluable RCA Treasurer 2003-2017, and to Steve Edwards, who is implementing enhancements to our financial management and reporting.

Another initiative this year was the development of a formal tree improvement plan for both the Upper and Lower Cemetery sections. We are grateful to have the highly capable assistance of Elise Polydoroff, who is the Assistant City Forester. The plan will begin with removals of trees that have been identified as in poor condition. A first round of planting many dozens of new trees will begin in spring 2018. Some of the trees will be provided as part of the Baltimore Road project, which requires a significant number of removals along Baltimore Road.

Rockville Cemetery is thriving, and still work remains to be done. The Board of Directors has an open position for anyone interested in becoming involved. I hope you will be generous with gifts this year. Your donations will help fund the tree plantings, pedestrian bridge, and other needed improvements.

Allen Bowie, Jr.

1737-1803 • Upper Cemetery, Section C-2, Lot 7, Site 7

Allen Bowie, Jr. is one of two known Revolutionary War patriots buried at Rockville Cemetery. Born in Prince George's County, he was the third generation of his family in Maryland.

When he came of age, Bowie inherited considerable acreage and a brick dwelling house at "The Hermitage," in lower Frederick County, which in 1776 became Montgomery County. In 1766, Bowie married his step-sister Ruth Cramphin (1742-1812). They had eight children, one of whom was Col. Washington Bowie (born in 1776), whose son was Richard Johns Bowie, owner of Glenview farm. Allen and Ruth Bowie belonged to the Anglican/Episcopal Church, in Prince George's Parish, which included the area of Rockville. By 1790 they owned 30 slaves and controlled hundreds of acres of land.

Allen Bowie, described in the census as a "planter" (farmer), and his step-brother Thomas Cramphin, Jr. participated in actions leading to the American Revolution. Both men protested British wrongs against the colonies by signing the Hungerford Resolves on June 11, 1774, and were elected to attend the First Convention soon thereafter. In the Maryland Militia, Bowie served as First Lieutenant in the 2nd Company, 29th Battalion, was commissioned Captain in 1776, and raised to Colonel in 1780.

During this time Bowie entered into business with Cramphin and others. The firm of Allen Bowie and Company used its substantial financial resources to lend money and deal in real estate during the Revolution. Bowie provided wheat for the military. In 1777, he helped to select the site of Montgomery Court House. Between that



year and 1800, at various times he served as one of the new county's first Justices, a Tax Commissioner, on the Levy Court, and as a County Commissioner in 1799.

Allen Bowie died testate in Montgomery County at the age of 66. Ruth passed away in 1812.

A century later, Janet Montgomery Chapter of the NSDAR marked the Bowie graves at Rockville Cemetery. *The Washington Post* described the program as "impressive, the autumn tints and falling leaves adding much of appropriateness and solemnity to the outdoor ceremony. An American flag covered the grave of him who did so much to help bring it into being. A large gathering of Montgomery County people were present, including descendants of Col. Bowie."

Interestingly, the handsome granite Bowie gravestone is not the original. It is of a more modern early 20th century design, and is inscribed on the front by "HEAGY." John M. Heagy operated a stone-cutting and monument business on East Montgomery Avenue in Rockville until his death in 1928.

- **Grounds Clean-up:** Such tasks as shrub pruning, minor tree, limb and vine removal, and removal of abandoned decorations were completed throughout the year, helping to maintain acceptable visual quality in all cemetery areas.

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Friendly Spirits Haunt Rockville Cemetery on Moonlit Ghost Tour

On the beautiful moonlit night of October 7, Rockville Cemetery and Peerless Rockville hosted “Rockville Cemetery Comes Alive! Rockville Cemetery Ghost Tour.” Two guided tours in the historic Upper Cemetery featured congenial local apparitions.

Dozens of visitors, treated to two all-terrain tours in a rare night-time foray by moonlight, followed the ghost of Martha McGaha to hear costumed actors tell stories of nine memorable individuals who appeared by their gravestones. Mrs. McGaha once maintained the sanctity of the caretaker’s house while her husband Thomas was cemetery superintendent.

Friendly spirits included Margaret Johns Beall, who welcomed visitors with a history of the cemetery, and Zelda Fitzgerald, who picnicked under the stars on the site of F. Scott Fitzgerald and her former graves.

Charismatic Judge Richard Johns Bowie entertained attendees, walking among the crowd urging citizens to public service, and the formidable Dora Higgins shocked and delighted visitors as she rocked in her chair and told how she protected her husband’s store through JEB Stuart’s stop in Rockville in 1863.

Visitors also met brave aviation pioneer and contemporary of the Wright Brothers, Col. Paul Peck, who told the poignant

story of his family who all perished tragically. Baseball Hall of Famer Walter “Big Train” Johnson came to talk about his life and stats (and grumble about the state of modern baseball!), enthraling the audience.

Folded flags and cardboard cutouts of Guy and John Carter adorned their grandfather’s grave, as their nephew spun the sad tale of their ships sinking within five months of each other during WWII.

Local educator and Confederate naval officer William Pinckney Mason thrilled the crowd with a personable account of his life. And each tour closed with readings from letters by captured Rebel soldier

Capt. James Anderson, who shared an eerie recording of “Rock Me to Sleep, Mother,” a favorite song on both sides during the Civil War.

- **Monument Cleaning:** Grave stones marking dozens of burial sites were successfully cleaned using prescribed methods, including many monuments cleaned by RCA board members,

- **Interpretive Tours:** On several occasions, RCA provided guided tours to interested community, school, and professional groups, highlighting cemetery history and biographies of notable burials. Our Ghost Tour is described above.
- **A Formal Landscaping Plan:** Significant time and expertise were donated to develop a formal plan

that provides a systematic process for the removal of unhealthy trees and shrubs in addition to the planting of appropriate native species, all in order to maintain appealing natural vistas throughout the cemetery.

- **“Unsung Heroes”:** Those unidentified individuals who – on several occasions - were observed removing trash from various areas while either visiting or simply passing through cemetery grounds. Their kindness is an example for all and an inspiration to a grateful Rockville Cemetery Association!

Volunteering will continue to be an integral part of Rockville Cemetery operations. There are endless opportunities to contribute to this noteworthy component of our local history, provide ongoing respects to families represented here, and support the preservation and function of these hallowed grounds. 
